1. Describe the current housing situation in our community. What are the main drivers of affordability challenges (property taxes, development types, lack of land, etc.)?
Intertwined factors:
 - 1) land restriction by rural buffer,
 - 2) regional high growth with influx of investors and high-earning workers,
 - 3) wage stagnation for low-paying jobs,
 - 4) lack of housing supply in the affordable range

2. What is the most important role of an elected official/local government in ensuring all community members can afford housing?
 - 1) strategic planning: AH needs, resources and sustainable strategy to meet the AH needs;
 - 2) compete/allocate federal, state and local funding for AH;
 - 3) policies to encourage AH construction and allocation;

6. Our community has seen growing polarization on arguments for increased housing density weighed against environmental impacts. What is your position on this discussion?

Environment and affordable housing shouldn't be pit against one another. Instead environment standards should be a strong consideration for affordable housing development in the new age of climate crisis. The tragedy of Chicago heat wave has shown that low income housing communities are extremely vulnerable to the impact of climate crisis. Numerous studies have shown that low-income communities are more prone to flooding, lower trees/shade coverage and up to 30 degrees hotter than more affluent neighborhoods. Adding the fact that many low income household can't afford air conditioning, the combination is deadly. Climate crisis also brings in more infectious diseases and will cause more infections and death in the low-income communities. Public transit and bike/walk connectivity is another environment initiative that goes hand in hand with affordability. Average households spend 30% on transportation, and many low income families can't afford a car. Providing non-auto connectivity opens economic opportunities for many low income families.

7. How would you implement systemic solutions to inequitable property taxes in our community?

The fact that 342 in 347 properties in the northside neighborhood has to adjust their property lower indicate a wide spread problem with property value reevaluation process. How spread is the problem? What is the pattern of the deviation? Are more expensive properties consistently being under-valued and low-cost properties over-valued. I'd request a wider investigation to get to the full scale of the problem and implement a more equitable property tax reevaluation process to all properties in our community.

8. How do you view affordable housing as a racial equity issue?

Due to redlining and systematic racism, people of the black and brown communities are consistently put in an economically disadvantaged position, many of them are facing the housing affordability challenge.
